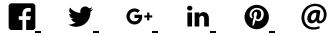

Kabbalah Scholar Rabbi Arthur Green to speak

Rabbi Arthur Green will discuss Jewish Mysticism and Kabbalah in the 21st Century on Dec. 10 at Temple Emanu-El, 514 Main St.

Green, one of the preeminent scholars of kabbalah and Jewish mysticism, was the founding dean and is currently rector of the Rabbinical School and Irving Brudnick Professor of Jewish Philosophy and Religion at Hebrew College. He is both a historian of Jewish religion and a theologian. His work seeks to form a bridge between these two distinct fields of endeavor. Green is the author of numerous books on Jewish spirituality, several of which will be available for purchase and signing following the program.

Temple Emanu-El also invites members of the public to participate in its new Breakfast with the Author program. For a donation of \$50 (which includes the suggested entrance contribution), join a small gathering for breakfast and conversation with Green prior to the presentation.
