Boston Archdiocese starts work on elderly housing in Hanover

Cardinal Sean O'Malley, the head of the Catholic Archdiocese of Boston, stuck a shovel in the ground and blessed several acres of upturned soil and concrete foundations in Hanover on Tuesday, at the official groundbreaking of an \$11.5 million affordable housing project for seniors backed by the archdiocese's development arm, the Planning Office for Urban Affairs.



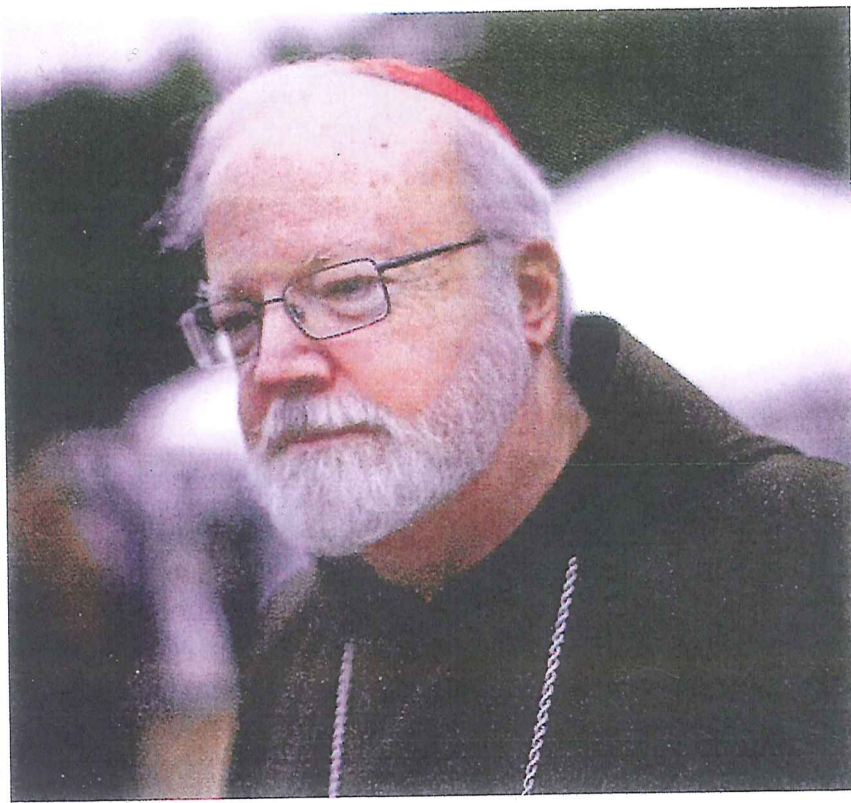
